As many individuals in different communities and neighborhoods will be celebrating St. Patrick's Day this weekend, have you ever wondered where the term "Luck of the Irish" came from? During this time, many of the Irish people who left their country due to starvation and disease showed a knack of digging up mining fortunes during the Gold Rush.
